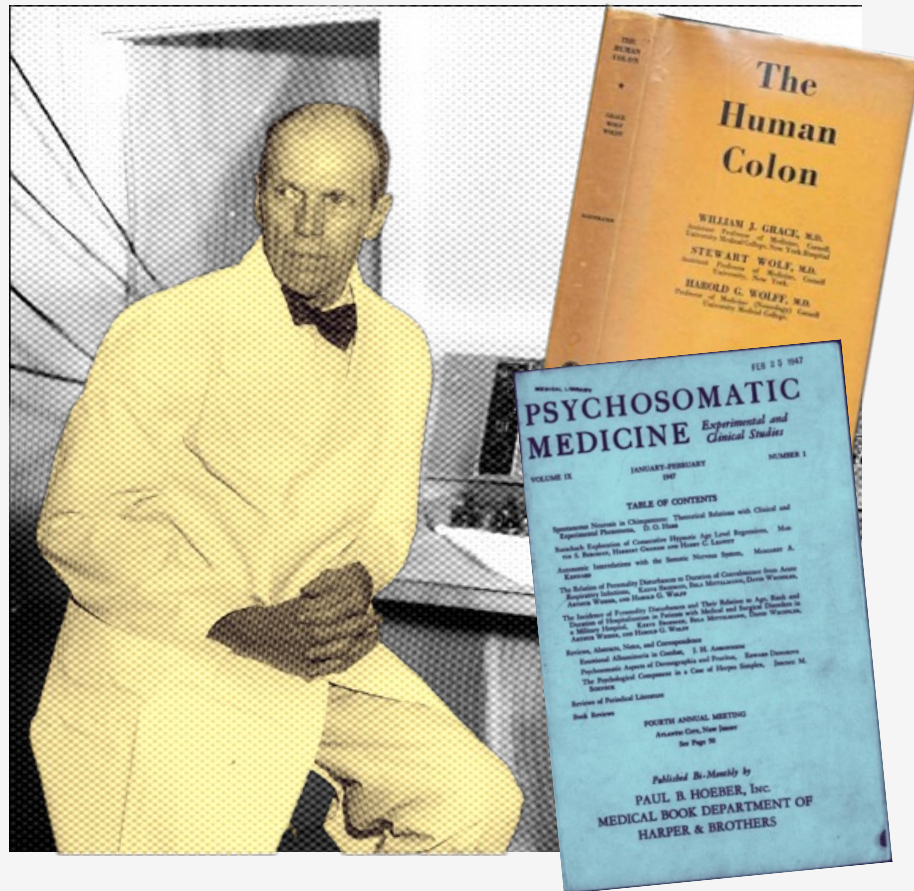


Ottawa Student Awarded Half of Faculty Prizes

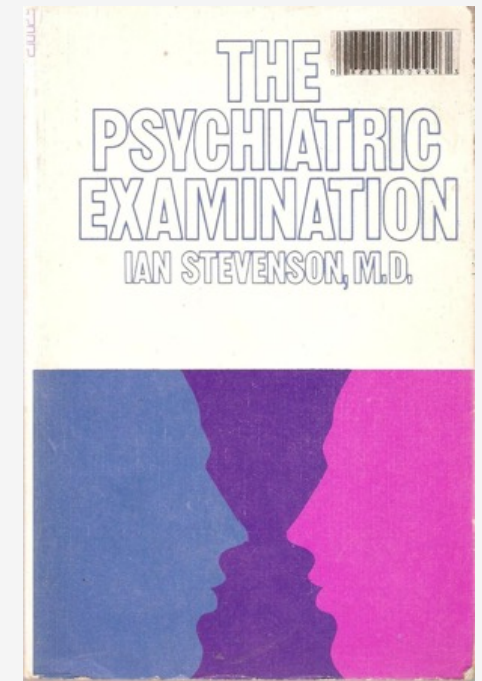
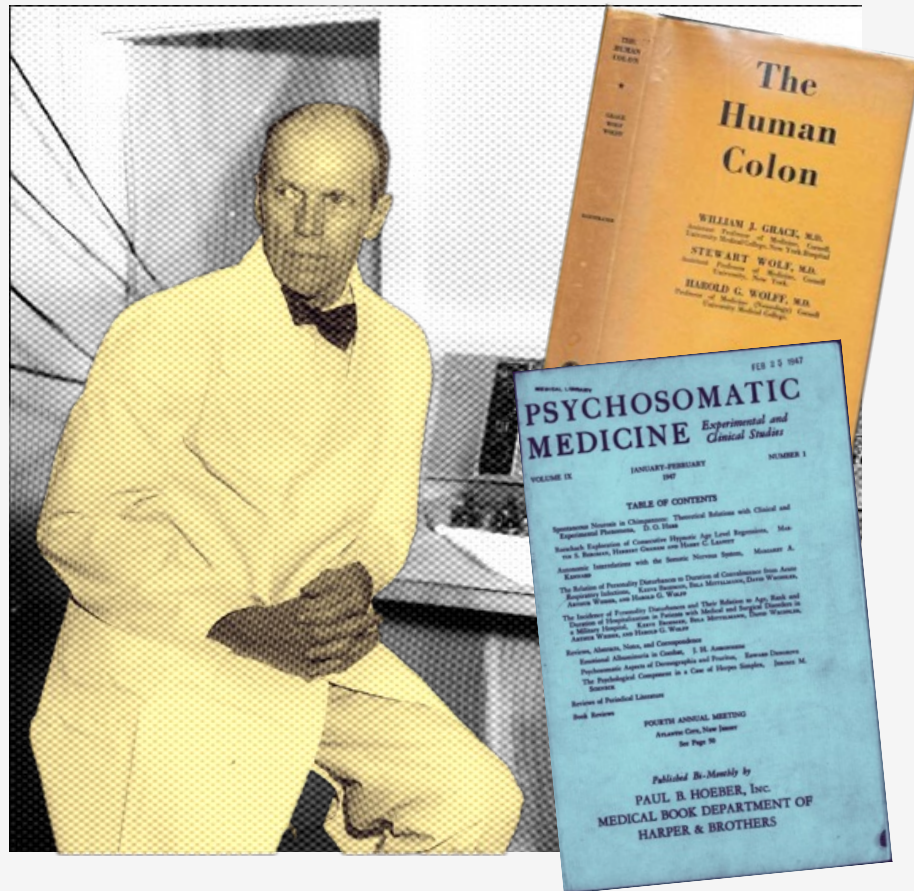
MONTREAL, Dec. 8—(C.P.)—
Ian P. Stevenson of Ottawa—one
of the 97 medical faculty students
of McGill University whose gradu-
ation was announced today—
copped half the prizes of the
faculty, winning the Holmes gold
medal for the highest aggregate
in all subjects forming the medi-
cal curriculum, the Robert Forsyth
prize in surgery, the Campbell
Howard prize in clinical medicine
and the J. Francis Williams fel-
lowship in medicine and clinical
medicine.

In addition to these awards, the
Ottawa student shared third place
with four other students in the
high aggregate standing in the
final year.

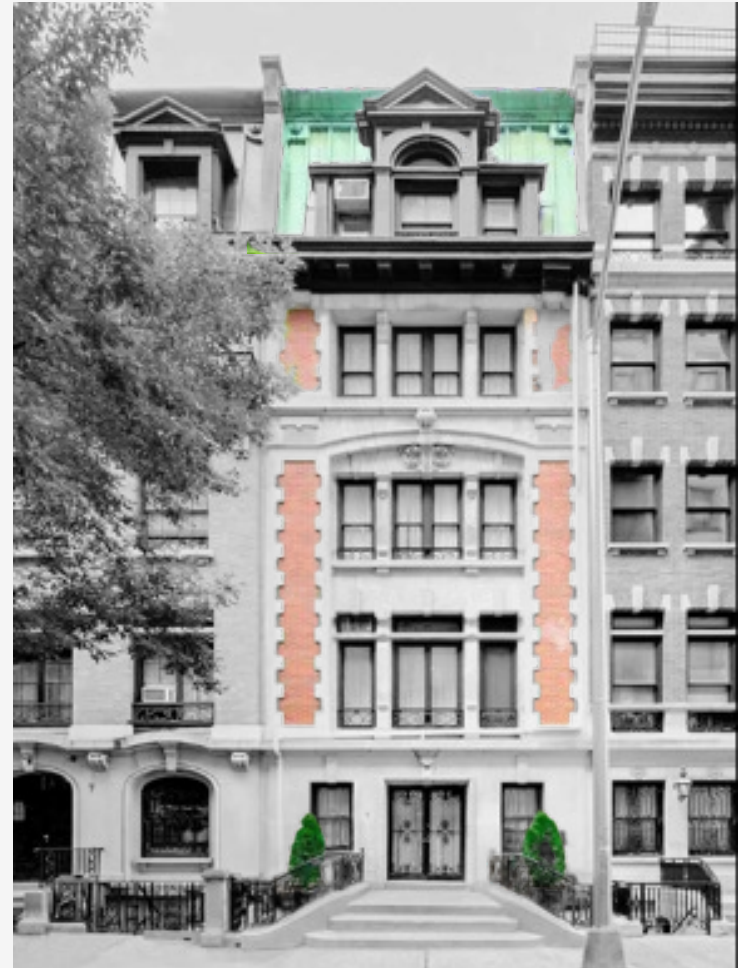


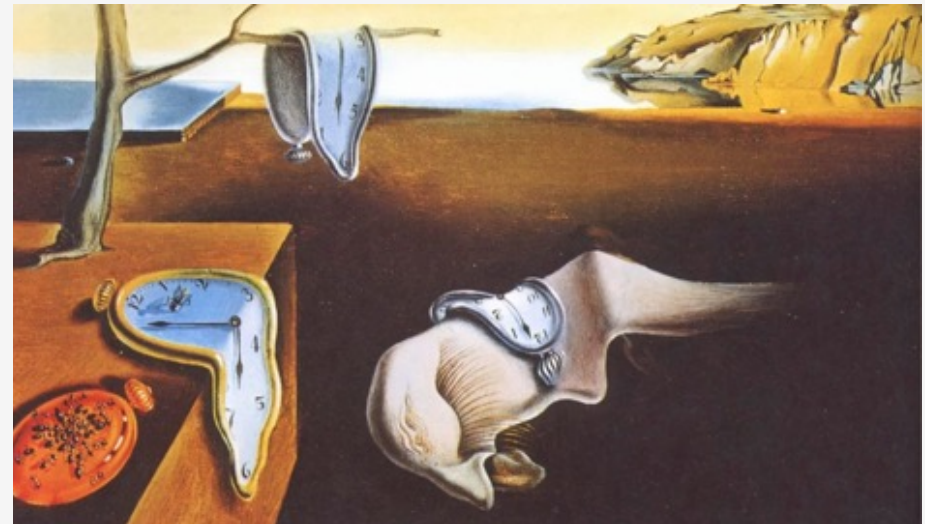

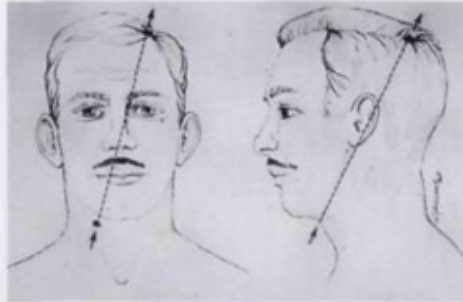


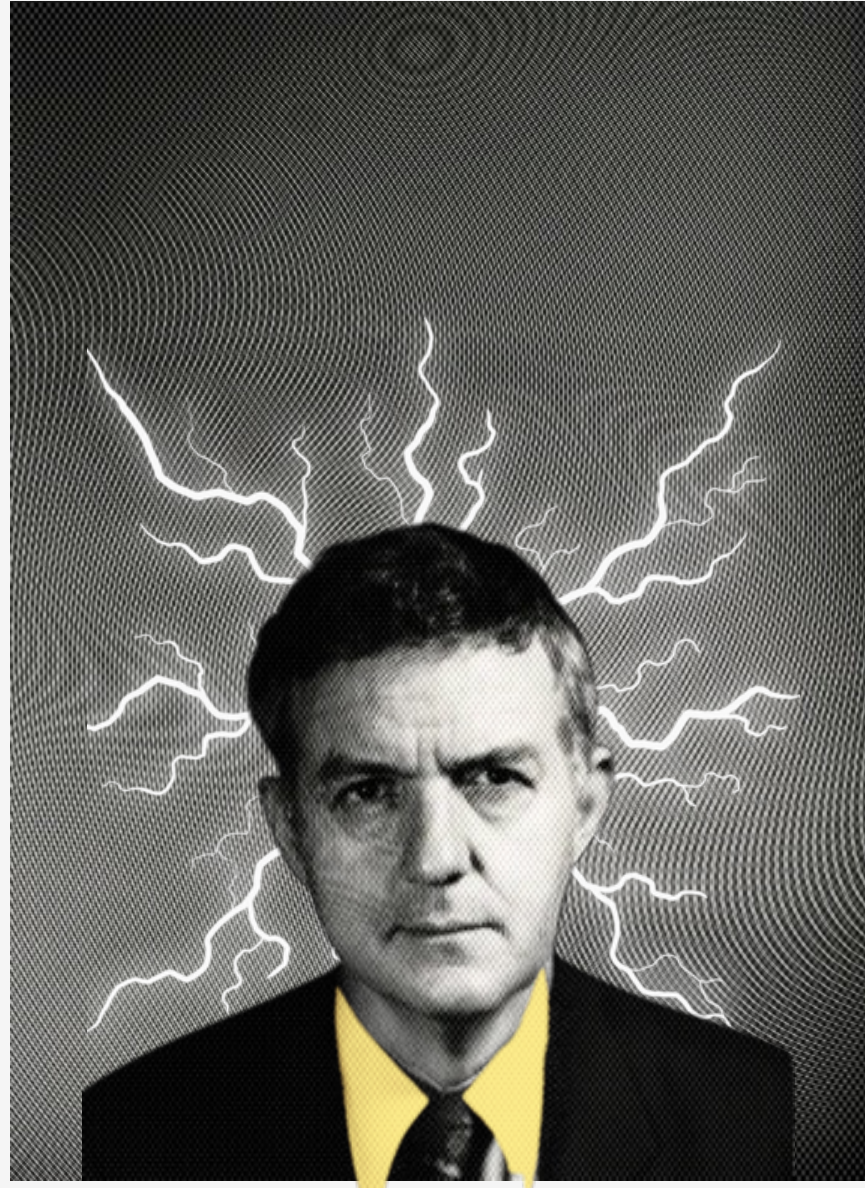
Figure 17 Artist's reconstruction of the trajectory of the bullet through the head of Cemil Hayik that would have caused wounds of entry and exit corresponding to the birthmarks on Cemil Fabrici.

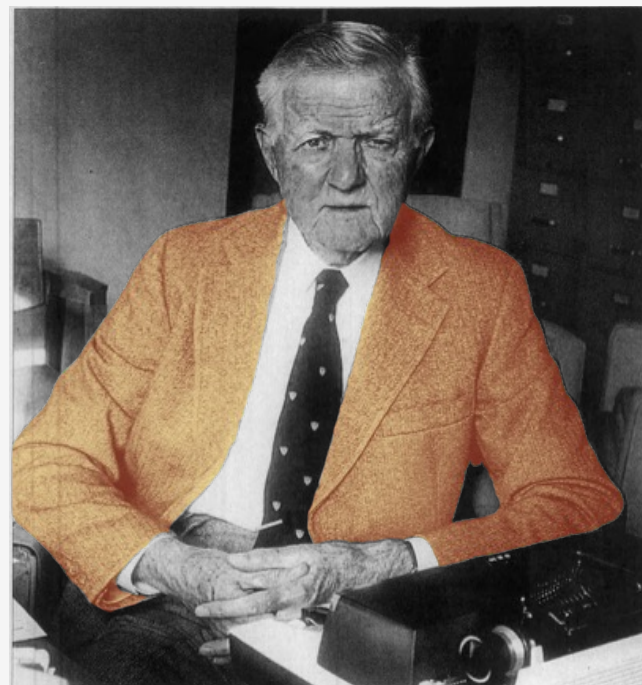
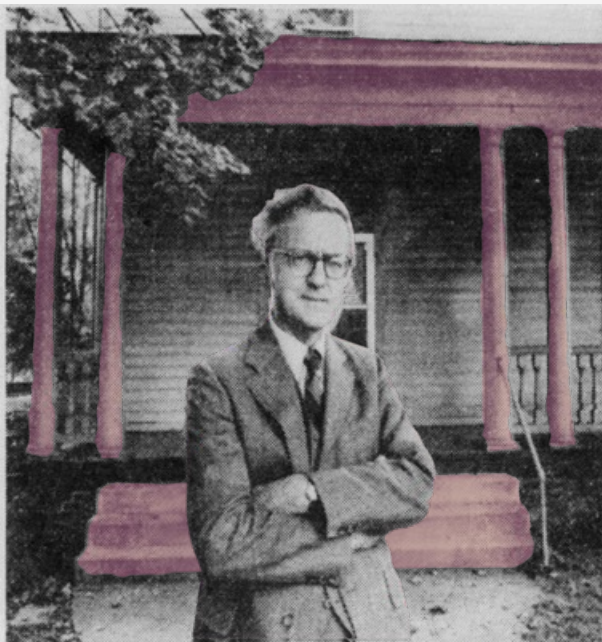
