22 February **Brexit and the Misreading of History** *Prof Robert Patman*

Trying to learn from history is both necessary and difficult. It is necessary because the past is the only data we have to deal with new events and challenges. But it is very difficult to apply lessons of history to contemporary situations because the entire process depends on the effective use of reasoning by analogy. And such reasoning can be flawed. This has been highlighted by the repeated claim that Brexit represents Winston Churchill's vision of Britain and Europe.

1 March **How Healthy is Democracy in New Zealand?** *Dr Chris Rudd*

Most of us believe we live in a democracy in New Zealand – and we have the rules and institutions to prove it! But a democracy is more than the sum of its laws and institutions. How well do those institutions function? Do people become involved in the democratic process or do we have an 'audience' democracy? These are some of the issues addressed in this talk.

15 March **Machiavellian Politics and the Rule of Law** *Dr Vicki Spencer*

This lecture examines Machiavelli's advice on how best to retain power in his notorious text, *The Prince*, which remains a handbook for many political advisers today. When its validation of the lust for power comes, however, to override all other concerns, Machiavellianism possesses inherent dangers for modern democracies. It can threaten, amongst other things, the rule of law, something I argue we are currently witnessing in the United States.
